Dear Mayor Hutchins and Councilors:

Re: request for a fenced dog park

There is a need for a large fenced dog park with a separate but adjoined smaller fenced area for small dogs. Ideally, this dog park would be approximately .05 acres with 75% of the area fenced for large dogs and the remaining 25% fenced for small dogs. There would be entrance and exit gates on both areas with a gate between them. There would be benches, garbage cans, a water source, lights for nighttime use, ample parking spaces and a covered area for the rainy days and a covered bulletin board for community awareness.

This would be a fenced dog park that the whole community can use daily. It will bring in people from neighboring communities to use it also. It can be an area where dog owners can meet and socialize while their dogs get their exercise and increase their socials skills.

There are many people who own large dogs but do not have the mobility to take these dogs for long hikes to exercise them. This park should be large enough that these owners can throw a ball for a long way and the dog has ample room to run after it. Transfer Beach is an unleashed area for dogs but not fenced. Thus small dogs get run over by the larger ones. The larger dogs, while playing have run into people who are visiting the beach area. The dogs can run out into traffic.

There is a fenced dog park on Beverly Road in Duncan that is the ideal park for dogs and owners. I have pictures of this park should you wish to view them. I have contacted Ernie Mansueti of North Cowichan Regional District. He has informed me by e-mail that the initial costs to build their fenced dog park were \$45,000. However, they owned the land. I have used this park for our large Lab and it is always busy and full of dogs and dog owners. I cannot vouch for a single user, but when there is more than one, people clean up after their dogs themselves.

To assist council, I have been contacting dog owners and the reaction has been overwhelming with support for a fenced dog park. I am just now having people sign a petition and I have over 60 signatures the first day.

As I have never initiated anything like this, I am unsure of what step to take next. If you have time, I could come in and see you with pictures of the dog park in Duncan and my signatures to date.

I am writing with concerns about cutting of trees on private property and to express my surprise that Ladysmith does not have a bylaw restricting any tree cutting on private property. Prior to moving to Ladysmith Jan 2010 we lived in the Lower Mainland and most if not all municipalities in that area have bylaws restricting tree cutting on private property. While I realize Vancouver Island generally has a more rural attitude, I find it odd there is no protection or consideration for protection of natural or otherwise trees on private property. I write now because I live at 705 Stirling Dr which backs onto the property at 606 Farrell Rd and today **because**, the owner of 606 Farrell Rd contracted Davey Tree Service to remove one large maple tree; 18"+ diameter and a coniferous tree; 32" diameter plus topping and limbing some other trees on the property. I was one of the concerned stakeholders involved in opposition to changes to Ladysmith Covenant EX60846 for 606 Farrell Rd at the Sep '10 council meeting and myself and some of the other stakeholders are now concerned this recent tree cutting could be a step by **because** to achieve what she could not achieve with a Covenant change.

I am therefore voicing my concern that Ladysmith does not have a private property tree cutting bylaw and I am suggesting that Council should start the process to put such a bylaw in place. I realize a bylaw of this sort restricts some freedom of private property development, but I believe all of Ladysmith would benefit from such control and preservation of one of Ladysmith's natural heritages.

An integrated pest management (IPM) approach has been employed in the development of the plan to ensure effective vegetation management and the protection of environmental values and human health. While mechanical and manual methods of vegetation control will primarily be used, the plan also incorporates the use of non-residual herbicides.

The PMP plan area encompasses the railway right-of-way owned by the Island Corridor Foundation and operated by SVI, including the 225 km-long Victoria Subdivision (from Victoria to Courtenay), the 5 km-long Wellcox Spur (Nanaimo-area), and associated yards, shops and other facilities. We are seeking comments on the proposed plan from all communities through which the railway passes.
