What about the "notice" embedded in this page (see photo attached) tells the citizens of Ladysmith that you give a hoot about their engagement in this process? I am on the look-out for stuff related to the OCP and did not even see the "notice" the first time I scanned the paper on Friday. It wasn't until Easter Monday, when I was looking for info related to the #70 Bus Survey, that I even noticed it.

Where is the banner heading to catch people's attention? The print is so small it requires a magnifying glass to read. You look at the page, see a big blob of gray, and your eyes glaze over as you move on! There should of been a full page notification with that much information to put out.

On March 16 there was an article in the Chronicle about the fact that the OCP (Official Community Plan) is going to a Public Hearing. The Mayor was quoted as saying "Hopefully we'll see the finish line this year...". That comment did not make me think that the Public Hearing would be anytime soon. It completely caught me by surprise. And once again, for a hugely important event to the whole community, there is virtually no TIME notice. The Chronicle came out on the 6th and the Public Hearing is on the 18th. At dinner time. There is only one newspaper coming out between the "notice" and the Public Hearing. Certainly no time to stir up some commentary.

I have witnessed the OCP process in three cities and all of them had so much more, and better, out reach for public engagement. Flyers and brochures were sent out to each house hold. Signage was put up around town. When something was in the newspaper it jumped out at you. And weeks, if not a month, of notice was provided for events and significant milestones. I just checked the town website and the OCP Review page is out of date. The OCP Review page also suggests you "sign up for the Town's Newsletter to stay up-to-date on the OCP Review and upcoming opportunities for you to participate in the process!" Both the January and April editions of the Newsletter do NOT include any information about the pending and/or confirmed Public Hearing date. Abysmal effort.

During the Municipal Election, last October, a gentleman in the audience at the All Candidates Meeting was concerned that there was so little information in the public realm about the OCP review process. The Mayor was sitting behind me and commented to his companion that there was all kinds of information on the website and had been for 18 months. While town Staff and Council congratulate themselves for their presence on-line and in social media (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter) they have failed to reach out to those of us who just don't want to, or can't, spend a lot of time on their computer or engaging in social media.

I have attached a photo showing one of the things they did in Sidney. Signage on the main road into town was up through the entire review/update period. The banner was changed to keep pace with events as the process unfolded. If you lived in Sidney, or were just passing through (like me), you could not be uninformed as to what was happening in regards to the OCP.

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An express bus has now been running between Nanaimo and Duncan for a full year, and riders of the route are being asked for feedback. B.C. Transit, the Regional

District of Nanaimo and the Cowichan Valley Regional District launched Route 70 NCX Nanaimo-Cowichan Express at the end of March last year. Now, operators are asking for input about travel times, bus stops and possible expansion "that will help finetune the service," stated a press

Buses run Monday to Saturday, beginning at downtown Nanaimo and travelling to Village Green Mall in Duncan. There is one Ladysmith stop on the route at First Avenue and the Trans-Canada High-

In December, citing ridership from late summer and early fall, B.C. Transit said the route saw average daily boardings of 89 passengers on weekdays
