PRC Department Updates

ADMINISTRATION SUMMARY

February Drop-In patrons were 606 and Membership scan were 3,052 to the facility.

The 2022 Spring Activity Guide is now available with registration started Monday, March 7. Printed copies are available at FJCC and locations throughout Ladysmith.

PROGRAM AREA SUMMARY

HEALTH & WELLNESS

Registration and participation numbers continue to increase for program areas of health and wellness. Fitness centre staff continue to receive a lot of positive feedback from the community and participants about the variety of program offerings and the ability to no longer need to register to attend the Fitness Centre.

AQUATICS

Demand and requests for aquatic and swim programs continue to remain high, in addition to pool rental bookings.

RECREATION - PRESCHOOL/CHILDREN/YOUTH

The Youth Zone Pre-Teen Program continued in February at over 100% capacity. We have added additional spots to accommodate more preteen participation.

Youth Zone continued in February on Fridays from 6 – 8 p.m. with approximately 14-20 youth in attendance every Friday. The Rec Room is open at lunch on Tuesdays – participation numbers continue to increase.

GENERAL RECREATION & SPORT

Many General Recreation - Adult programs in January and February were canceled due to low registration, presumably in part due to Omicron and changes to PHO. These programs included Spanish and French language classes, meditation and a few arts and craft classes.

Many Sport – Adult programs continue to see an increase in participation. These programs include outdoor soccer at Forrest Field, indoor soccer at FJCC, and pickleball at FJCC. Staff are currently investigating program options for drop-in indoor volleyball and badminton at FJCC.

SPECIAL EVENTS

On Monday, February 21, we hosted two free Family Day Swims and Gym activities at the FJCC. Session #1 was from 12:00-1:30pm and session #2 was from 2:00-3:30pm. Special family-oriented activities and games were facilitated in the pools and gymnasium, with a focus on family, inclusivity, physical activity and physical literacy. Healthy to-go snacks were provided at the end of the event. The Town received a \$1,000 grant from BCRPA to offset the costs to host this event.

PROGRAM AREA PROJECTS

NEW HORIZONS FOR SENIORS

Staff continue to plan and implement the four programs under the umbrella of the New Horizons for Seniors grant project. The four programs include: Cooking with Tradition, It's not Right, Dig It! Gardening Program and Gentle Minds and Motion. All project activities will be wrapped up by the end of March.

STORYBOOK WALK

The Town and LRCA have signed a MOU to continue the Storybook Walk project at Brown Drive Park. Books will be switched out every two weeks. PRC Program staff continue to be very involved in this project through the planning and implementation stages. Look for the new season of stories and physical literacy movement guides starting on April 5.

Facility Projects

Transfer Beach Upgrades

- Transfer Beach Washrooms Renovations continues to move forward making more and more progress each day.
- Kinsmen and Sportsman Shelters- Renovations are on hold until the new structural recommendation from the engineer come in. The Sportsman shelter will be done once the Kinsmen shelter is completed.
- Canoe Shelter The renderings for the redesigned canoe shelter has been approved by Stz'uminus. The structural drawings are in the process of being completed

LAFF Shelter

• The shelter that will be built in the Aggie Hall Park has now started. The LAFF shelter used the same design as the shelter at Transfer Beach that our TOL staff built 5 years ago.

Waste Water Treatment Plant

 Roof repairs and partial replacement of the spirogester building will be completed this week.

Major Repairs (What has impacts to the community)

• Main VFD drive (pump) failed at FJCC and we had to close the main pool down for 2 days until the parts arrived.

Items to Highlight or acknowledge

 We have implemented a new work alone service. It is an app based service called OK Alone. It has many safety features that will help our staff who may work alone to be monitored during that time.
